Administrative Analyst Figueroa and Frances Jemmott, City Consultant, presented the staff report.

In response to Vice Chair Gonzalez, Consultant Jemmott explained that Puente Learning Center was not recommended due to its ability to access other funding sources. She further explained that Via Care was not recommended, nor any major clinics, due to the expectation that they would have funding reinforcements.

Vice Chair Gonzalez expressed concern that the proposed recipients were mainly from the southeast area. He suggested removing Alzheimer's Greater Los Angeles and East Los Angeles Woman's Center since they had large budgets and access to other funding and allocating those funds to Via Care.

In response to Chair Gaviña, Consultant Jemmott explained the \$20,000 grant to Alzheimer's Greater Los Angeles would be used toward its Spanish language access project.

In response to Member Edry, Consultant Jemmott explained that organizations were required to follow auditing guidelines established for charitable foundations which were highly scrutinized by the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) and the City required biannual reports from the grantees.

Vice Chair Gonzalez suggested reallocating the \$20,000 from Alzheimer's Greater Los Angeles and \$100,000 from East Los Angeles Women's Center to Via Care. Consultant Jemmott explained that Via Care requested \$60,000 for dental services to low-income families.

MOTION

Vice Chair Gonzalez moved to reallocate the \$20,000 proposed to Alzheimer's Greater Los Angeles to Via Care contingent on positive due diligence.

Member Edry suggested using a portion of the Alzheimer's Greater Los Angeles funds for Via Care.

Vice Chair Gonzalez withdrew the motion based on the direction that staff encourage Via Care to apply for the next round of grants.

SUBJECT

Revised Vernon CommUNITY Fund (VCF) Scholarship Program Applicant Package and Guidelines

Recommendation:

- A. Recommend that the City Council adopt changes via ordinance to Vernon Municipal Code Section 2.48.110, updating VCF Scholarship criteria by modifying the existing applicant residency requirement to allow students attending school in the Vernon Area to apply and removing the 12-month minimum Vernon Area residency requirement;
- B. Approve certain non-substantive changes in the revised VCF Scholarship Program Applicant Package, as submitted for implementation and distribution beginning January 2023; and
- C. Approve certain non-substantive changes in the revised VCF Scholarship Program Guidelines, as submitted for continued internal use.

Background:

At its November 8, 2017 meeting, the VCF Grant Committee (Grant Committee) approved the implementation of the VCF Scholarship Program (Program), as per the recommendation of its VCF Scholarship Subcommittee (Subcommittee). Thereafter, the Subcommittee, City staff, and grantmaking consultant, Jemmott Rollins Group, convened to address program details, timeline, and administration of the program.

Program development occurred over the course of 2018, culminating with the VCF Grant Committee's approval of the VCF Scholarship Application Package at its November 28, 2018 meeting. As such, the Program was ready for kick-off in January of 2019, and the Grant Committee has awarded VCF Scholarships to deserving high school seniors in the Vernon Area each year since. After having utilized the application over the last four years, staff is now recommending updates that will serve to refine the application and more efficiently facilitate staff's review process. A summary of suggested edits to the application package has been included below:

- 1. Allow Students Who Attend School in Vernon Area Apply (change via ordinance): Currently, the VCF only allows residents of the Vernon Area to submit a VCF Scholarship application. The proposed change ensures that students at area schools (regardless of residency) will also be eligible, slightly broadening the applicant pool for the program and offering the VCF scholarship opportunity to more students while still ensuring that the program remains within a manageable scope for the City to administer.
- 2. Remove 12-Month Minimum Residency Requirement (change via ordinance): Since proposed updates to the application will allow students from Vernon Area schools to apply without residency, this stringent requirement seems unnecessary. Additionally, the duration of residency reported by applicants is difficult for staff to verify.
- 3. Clarify Recommendation Form Requirement: In each scholarship grant cycle, there are select applicants that do not submit the required recommendation forms included in the

- VCF Scholarship Applicant Package. As such, certain sections of the application that reference recommendation forms have been revised for clarity.
- 4. *Incorporate Administrative Updates and Cleanup:* A few additional non-substantive updates have been addressed in the revised scholarship application which include modifications to outdated Vernon Municipal Code Sections and other minor adjustments to language.

Recommendation Numbers 1 and 2 noted above will require City Council adoption of an ordinance that will modify such criteria in Vernon Municipal Code (VMC) Section 2.48.110. If the Grant Committee is amenable to staff's suggested changes and recommends that said changes be adopted, staff will propose a revised ordinance for adoption at a future City Council meeting to amend the VMC as specified.

Proposed revisions to the Program Guidelines are aligned with changes indicated above and as identified in the VCF Scholarship Applicant Package. The Program Guidelines are utilized internally to reinforce the Grant Committee's goals for the VCF Scholarship.

The VCF Scholarship Program is designed to benefit a broad class of beneficiaries through an objective process that is nondiscriminatory in nature and the VCF Scholarship Applicant Package and related Program Guidelines have been designed with this mission in mind. The revised VCF Scholarship Program Applicant Package and Guidelines have been reviewed and approved as to form by the City Attorney's Office.

It is the hope of the Vernon CommUNITY Fund and Vernon City Council that the VCF Scholarship Program will be a vehicle that offers many motivated, exceptional young people a path to accomplish their academic and career goals.

I. Vernon CommUNITY Fund Scholarship Program Guidelines

The Vernon CommUNITY Fund (VCF) Scholarship Program focuses on 12th grade students living <u>or attending school</u> in the Vernon Area (which includes the cities of Vernon, Maywood, Bell, Huntington Park, Commerce, the area within the City of Los Angeles known as Boyle Heights, and the unincorporated area known as East Los Angeles).

Scholarship Criteria

Vernon Municipal Code ("VMC") Section 2.166(a)(vi)48.120(B) sets forth the specific selection criteria for scholarship recipients and will be the specific standards used to identify qualified applicants who, ultimately, will be recommended as scholarship recipients. Selection criteria have been identified to clearly define the profile of the scholarship recipient.

Many factors will be considered when evaluating scholarship applicants. Scholarship criteria include an applicant's financial need, academic achievement, and the geographic distribution of scholarships. The scholarship criteria support the purpose of the Vernon CommUNITY Fund, which was established to provide charitable contributions in support of improved quality of life, strengthening of families, and affirmation of Vernon's ties with neighboring communities in pursuit of bright futures. The Vernon CommUNITY FundVCF Scholarship Program was created to provide disadvantaged youth in the Vernon Area the opportunity to achieve success in their post-secondary educational endeavors.

Award Criteria

- Financial need (30 points)
- Community/extracurricular involvement and leadership (30 points)
- Academic achievement (20 points)
- Awards and recognition (10 points)
- Personal and/or family attributes and values (10 points)

Eligibility

12th grade students enrolling in a post-secondary educational institution with full-time status who reside <u>or attend</u> school in the Vernon Area (as defined above) may submit an application for a <u>Vernon CommUNITY Fund (VCF)</u> Scholarship.

Specific eligibility standards are identified within this section. In order to be considered for award, applicants must meet <u>all</u> of the following detailed criteria:

- Graduating High School Senior
- Achievement of a Minimum Weighted Grade Point Average of 2.0 in high school level coursework for trade school or two-year College applicants; or Minimum Weighted Grade Point Average of 2.5 in high school level coursework for four-year College/University applicants at the time of VCF Scholarship application submission



- Pursuit of a two-year or four-year Degree from accredited College/University; or pursuit of Trade School Certification
- Full-time enrollment at post-secondary educational institution of choice (minimum of 12 units for college) at the time of award
- Immediate transition into a post-secondary educational institution upon graduation from high school (must begin post-secondary coursework within 6 months of graduation)
- Residency or school attendance in the Vernon Area (U.S. Citizenship is not required); minimum Area residency of 12 months
- Demonstration of strong leadership skills and responsibility (successfully communicated in scholarship application)
- Active in extracurricular activities (i.e., school/community involvement/employment/internship)
- A minimum of 20 hours of community service from 9th grade to first semester of 12th grade
- Not a City of Vernon employee or a legal dependent of a City of Vernon employee, Vernon City-appointed official, or Vernon City-elected official

Application Procedures

The information requested on the application is a reflection of the selection criteria designated for the VCF Scholarship Program. The following question and answer section (Q&A) addresses issues related to the VCF Scholarship application process:

- **Q:** Where and when are scholarship applications available?
- **A:** Beginning on January 1st of each year, applications will be available on the Vernon CommUNITY Fund website: www.vernoncommunityfund.org
- **Q:** Where should scholarship applications be submitted?
- A: Students may submit their complete application packages to the Vernon City Hall City Administration Office. Contact information is available on the website if any questions or technical issues arise during the application submission process.
- **Q:** When are scholarship applications due?
- **A:** The Vernon CommUNITY Fund will accept scholarship applications through the last Thursday in March.
- **Q:** What additional information/documents must accompany the scholarship application?
- As per the eligibility criteria noted above, students must submit proof that they reside and have resided for at least 12 months or attend school in the Vernon Area (e.g. utility bills, proof of school enrollment);

most recent report card; evidence of GPA with high school transcripts; sworn statement (found on the Vernon CommUNITY Fund website in scholarship applicant package) of a teacher or program director/supervisor with knowledge that applicant has performed the minimum amount of community service; and evidence of extracurricular activities. Although not required, students may also include letter(s) of recommendation, and/or letter(s) from post-secondary educational institution(s) along with their scholarship application.

Q: How and when will the scholarship award winners be notified?



A: Scholarship grant applicants recommended for award will be reviewed at the regular VCF Grant Committee meeting in May. Applicants selected for award will be notified within one week of scholarship award via email.

Q: How and when will the scholarship awards be disbursed?

A: Award disbursement will occur in June, with checks directly mailed to scholarship grantees.

The VCF Grant Committee retains the right to withhold scholarship grants in any given year if no candidate is determined to be qualified.

Additional Considerations

- Scholarship amount will be based on applicant competition and funds available for award
- Personal interview of scholarship applicant may or may not be required, and shall be determined after initial review of applicant pool
- Applications may be summarily denied, with or without prior notification to the applicant, if any statements or representations in the application and supporting materials are found to be untruthful, dishonest, or misleading

Selection Procedures

Procedures for selection of award will mirror the current process used for the award of direct service grants and capital grants—through the Vernon CommUNITY Fund. The initial evaluation of a scholarship application will be a joint effort amongst City staff and consultant, Jemmott Rollins Group (JRG). Ultimately, the application of any candidate(s) recommended for award will be brought to the Vernon CommUNITYVCF Grant Committee in May for deliberation and approval(s) of grant(s).

The VCF Scholarship Program is designed to benefit a broad class of beneficiaries through an objective process that is nondiscriminatory in nature.



II. Vernon CommUNITY Fund Scholarship Program Timeline

A VCF Scholarship Program Timeline has been established based upon the calendar year. In summary, applications are accepted beginning January 1st through the last Thursday in March of a given year. In May, the Vernon CommUNITY Fund Grant Committee will select scholarship grantees. Funds for scholarship awards will be dispersed in June to all scholarship grant recipients.

January – March

Window to receive candidate applications for VCF Scholarship Program

April

Review of candidate applications to determine recommended grant awards for VCF Grant Committee approval

May

Approval of VCF Scholarship Grant Awards at the regular May VCF Grant Committee Meeting (held on the 3rd Wednesday in May at 10:00 a.m.)

June

VCF Scholarship Grant Awards are processed for payment

The Vernon CommUNITY Fund (VCF) "Pilot" Scholarship Program targets its grant making activity toward 12th grade students living or attending school in the Vernon Area (which includes the cities of Vernon, Maywood, Bell, Huntington Park, Commerce, the area within the City of Los Angeles known as Boyle Heights, and the unincorporated area known as East Los Angeles).

Scholarship Criteria

Vernon Municipal Code (VMC) Section 2.166(a)(vi)48.120(B) sets forth the specific selection criteria for scholarship recipients and will be the specific standards used to identify qualified applicants who, ultimately, will be recommended as scholarship recipients. Selection criteria have been identified to clearly define the profile of the scholarship recipient.

Many factors will be considered when evaluating scholarship applicants. Scholarship criteria include an applicant's financial need, academic achievement, and the geographic distribution of scholarships. The criteria selected support the purpose of the Vernon CommUNITY Fund which was established to provide charitable contributions in support of improved quality of life, strengthening of families, and affirming Vernon's ties with neighboring communities in pursuit of bright futures. The Vernon CommUNITY Fund VCF Scholarship Program was created to provide disadvantaged youth in the Vernon Area the opportunity to achieve success in their post-secondary educational endeavors.

Award Criteria (not in order of priority)

- Financial need
- Academic achievement
- Community/extracurricular involvement
- Leadership
- Awards and recognition
- Personal and/or family attributes

Eligibility

12th grade students enrolling in a post-secondary educational institution with full-time status who reside <u>or</u> <u>attend school</u> in the Vernon Area (as defined above) may submit an application for a <u>Vernon CommUNITY Fund</u> <u>(VCF)</u> Scholarship.

Specific eligibility standards are identified in within this section. In order to be considered for award, applicants must meet all of the following detailed criteria:

- Graduating High School Senior
- Achievement of a Minimum Weighted Grade Point Average of 2.0 in high school level coursework for trade school or two-year College applicants; or Minimum Weighted Grade Point Average of 2.5 in high

- Immediate transition into a post-secondary educational institution upon graduation from high school (must begin post-secondary coursework within 6 months of graduation)
- Residency <u>or school attendance</u> in the Vernon Area (U.S. Citizenship is <u>not</u> required); <u>minimum</u> <u>residency of 12 months</u>
- Demonstration of strong leadership skills and responsibility (successfully communicated in scholarship application)
- Active in extracurricular activities (school/community involvement/employment)
- A minimum of 20 hours of community service from 9th grade to first semester of 12th grade
- Not a City of Vernon employee or relative¹ or dependent of a City of Vernon employee, Vernon City-appointed official, or Vernon City-elected official

Application Procedures

The information requested on the application is a reflection of the selection criteria designated for the VCF Scholarship Program. The following question and answer section (Q&A) addresses procedures related to the submission of a VCF Scholarship application:

- **Q:** Where and when are scholarship applications available?
- **A:** Beginning on January 1st of each year, applications will be available on the Vernon CommUNITY Fund website: www.vernoncommunityfund.org
- **Q:** Where should scholarship applications be submitted?
- **A:** Students may submit their applications via the online portal available at the Vernon CommUNITY Fund website. Contact information is available on the website if any questions or technical issues arise during the application submission process.
- **Q:** When are scholarship applications due?

most recent report card; evidence of GPA with high school transcripts; sworn statement (on form found on the Vernon CommUNITY Fund website) of a teacher or program director/supervisor with knowledge that applicant has performed the minimum amount of community service; and evidence of extracurricular activities. Although not required, students may also include letter(s) of recommendation, and/or letter(s) of acceptance to from post-secondary educational institution(s) along with their scholarship application.

Q: How and when will the scholarship award winners be notified?

A: Scholarship grant applicants recommended for award will be reviewed at the regular VCF Grant Committee meeting in May. Applicants selected for award will be notified within one week of scholarship award via email.

Q: How and when will the scholarship awards be disbursed?

A: Award disbursement will occur in June, with checks directly mailed to scholarship grantees.

The VCF Grant Committee retains the right to withhold scholarship grants in any given year if no candidate is determined to be qualified.

Additional Considerations

- Scholarship value range will be based on applicant competition and funds available for award
- Personal interview of scholarship applicant may or may not be required, and shall be determined after initial review of applicant pool
- Applications may be summarily denied, with or without prior notification to the applicant, if any statements or representations in the application and supporting materials are found to be untruthful, dishonest, or misleading

Selection Procedures

Procedures for selection of award will not differ from the current process employed for the award of direct service grants and capital grants through the Vernon CommUNITY Fund. The initial evaluation of the merit of a scholarship application will be a joint effort amongst City staff and Jemmott Rollins Group (JRG). Ultimately, any candidate(s) recommended for award will be brought to the Vernon CommUNITYVCF Grant Committee in May for deliberation and approval(s) of grant(s).

The VCF Scholarship Program is designed to benefit a broad class of beneficiaries through an objective process that is nondiscriminatory in nature.

Program Timeline

A VCF Scholarship Program Timeline has been established based upon the calendar year. In summary, applications are accepted beginning January 1st through March 31st of a given year. In May, the Vernon

CommUNITY Fund Grant Committee will select scholarship grantees. Funds for scholarship awards will be dispersed in June to all scholarship grant recipients.

Background:

As one of the key elements of the City's good governance reforms, the City Council created the Vernon CommUNITY Fund (VCF) to provide grants to charitable and governmental entities for projects and programs that benefit those residing and working in Vernon. Given the exclusively industrial nature of Vernon, the City Council determined that the VCF was in the best interest of the City and its residents, businesses, and workers.

On February 4, 2014, the City Council established the Vernon CommUNITY Fund Grant Committee (Grant Committee) and provided the basic guidelines and operational procedures for said Committee and its officers, including those related to the allocation of funds and the processes for reviewing and ranking applications and awarding grants.

To assist in the administration of VCF grantmaking, the City retained the services of Jemmott Rollins Group, Inc. (JRG) to provide consultation, guidance, research and specialized support services to the City Administrator and City staff for all matters related to the VCF. JRG has extensive experience in non-profit grantmaking and grants management and functional knowledge of ethics and principles governing the grantmaking process.

Fiscal Year (FY) 2021-22 Funding Recap

Pursuant to Vernon Municipal Code (VMC) Section 2.48.100, the City Council may appropriate funds to the VCF. Through the normal budgetary process, City Council authorized an amount of \$500,000 to the VCF for FY 2021-22. The Grant Committee is required to allocate funds for FY 2021-22 in accordance with the following formula:

- a. Administrative Costs shall be determined for the fiscal year and the amount shall be allocated for payment from funds appropriated to the VCF.
- b. The remainder of available funds in any fiscal year may be awarded to proposals to expend funds on direct services and/or scholarship grants. No single grant of this type shall be in an amount more than \$250,000.

In consideration of Administrative Costs of \$106,675, the total maximum amount of grant funds available for award to proposals for Direct Services and/or Scholarship Grants during FY 2021-22 is \$373,325. At its May 19, 2021 meeting, the VCF Grant Committee approved an allocation distribution in the amount of \$20,000 toward the VCF Scholarship Program. As such, JRG and City staff recommend the Grant Committee award \$20,000 in scholarship grants for FY 2021-22 in the specified amounts to the individual students identified in this staff report.

Criteria for Ranking Scholarship Grant Applicants

Pursuant to VMC Section 2.48.120(B), all eligible scholarship applicants must be ranked using the following:

Award Criteria (not in order of priority)

- 1. Financial need
- 2. Academic achievement
- 3. Community/extracurricular involvement
- 4. Leadership at school or in the community
- 5. Awards and recognition
- 6. Personal and/or family attributes, as demonstrated through scholarship application process

FY 2021-22 Scholarship Grant Applications

There are five (5) FY 2021-22 Scholarship grant candidates presented for review, deliberation, and award by the Grant Committee. All applicants meet the eligibility requirements set forth in VMC Section 2.48.110(B) and all applications were thoroughly vetted by JRG and City staff using the aforementioned ranking criteria.

Based on the application criteria, due diligence findings, and the amount of funding available, the total amount of scholarship grant funding recommended for FY 2021-22 is \$20,000.

Recommended scholarship recipient information is summarized in each evaluation form attached hereto as Attachment 1. These materials and recommendations are to be used only as guiding documents for the Grant Committee's deliberation. Full student applications have been included as Attachment 2. The Grant Committee is expected to discuss the content of each application at its May 18, 2022 meeting.

Fiscal Impact:

The FY 2021-22 VCF Docket II total recommended Scholarship Grant award amount of \$20,000 is included in the 2021/2022 City Budget under Community Promotion Account No. 011.1021.797000, and is within the recommended Grant Committee allocation distribution of \$20,000 for Scholarship Grants.

- Identify work, volunteer, internship(s), and/or extracurricular experience and how and why it has impacted you
- Describe who or what has most influenced and motivated you to pursue a higher level of education and explain why
- Indicate why receiving a scholarship from the Vernon CommUNITY Fund will assist you in achieving your academic goals
- Discuss your academic ability and potential to be successful in your pursuits
- Provide a coherent, well-organized written product that conveys why you should receive a VCF Scholarship
- Identify any unique characteristics about yourself, your family and/or life circumstances that you would like to be considered in the evaluation of your application package

The prompts above appear in no particular order of importance, nor are you required to address each in your essay. The essay guide has been designed to provide you with insight into what the VCF Grant Committee may be interested in learning about you as a VCF Scholarship Applicant.

Your essay must be submitted in the following format:

- Typed (12 point font)
- Double spaced
- Written in first-person
- A combined total of three (3) pages or less

Reminders for Your Written Work

Structure/Organization

Your essay should give the reader a concise sense of who you are and how your particular life experiences have contributed to your current path. The structure of the essay should support its overall message and convey your personality. The story that you are telling should be logical, with a clear introduction, solid supporting ideas, and a conclusion.



Specific Examples

If you choose to reference life experiences or situations in your essay, they should be specific and not general. Each example that you include in your essay should help showcase your character traits and distinguish you, as an individual, from the other applicants.

Significance

The experiences or situations you include in the essay should address the prompts in a meaningful way. Additionally, they should show significance to your overall message, and lend support to your educational, career, and personal goals.

The sixth grade: strife and struggle throughout. My diagnosis of Leukemia came with a downpour of negatives. Never would I have been able to accept the inevitable fate of my life: separation from the classroom and an inability to participate in athletic activities. The entirety of 2016 thereby remained an experience of homeschooling. I was given the time to work with an instructor, isolating me from the environment of a true class and the whole of my student body. As my academic and athletic liberties were stripped from me, I was left with nothing but a longing for such liberties; I craved activity.

The return to the classroom environment in 2017 was one to remember. I was slowly being given the education that I once lost, but that did not rid me of a medical life. My high school years have shifted me further from my diagnosis, but that part of my life would never be forgotten; I would still have to return to the hospital every three months for maintenance of my Leukemia. The realization was made here that I must make the most of every opportunity, beginning with my acceptance into my high school. Though this would be the start of a return to normalcy, my life would never be completely normal. This did urge me, however, to take advantage of the educational opportunities and extracurricular activities that were once stripped from me.

I was now able to pursue my sought-after educational prowess: I was admitted into various academic courses that most students were not, and I made the most out of each course and educational resource that my course instructors provided to give me the cumulative knowledge I need to pursue a collegiate-level education in Aerospace Engineering. Though, my academic pursuit is not complete without my athletic pursuit. Being able to run Track and Field for the past two years has allowed me the life that was once stripped away; the neuropathy that defeated me once has now been overcome. Taking advantage of my training, I proved successful

on the track, getting faster each race. Ultimately, my diagnosis has shaped me into a person who strives to seize every opportunity planted within my grasp and to truly believe that everything happens for a reason. It is here that my values, instilled in me by my parents, has shed light on my life and has inspired me to lead others along their way to achieving their goals.

As a Youth Leader for my community, I was able to detail my experiences to the student audience. This, of course, allowed me to shed light on the students' pursuit. I had the opportunity to share my experience of my diagnosis of Leukemia and its relevance in growth as an individual. I shared with the students that along my three-year journey of childhood cancer, every obstacle faced--from the moment of my diagnosis to the side effects of chemotherapy--had spurred a disillusion. It was not until the completion of my journey that I noticed a spark of rekindled belief. Incidentally, the conclusion of my journey proved to me that everything has a reason; my diagnosis is the very reason I have grown humbled and have developed an appreciation for life in itself.

With this story, I had given the students insight on how their lives may be fated, but their fate is all for a purpose. Enlightening the students with reason behind the need for a positive outlook in their lives allowed me to fully engage with each one of them, allowing me to guide them through the various opportunities for personal reflection. In fact, engaging in personal reflection with each of the students proved to be a means of finding who I am today.

Realizing the struggle that many people go through in my community and the lack of opportunity these people face, I had taken advantage of the resources that have been given to me to provide a light of inspiration. For this reason, I had chosen to involve myself with the elementary school I attended in East Los Angeles, to encourage the students of all grades to take part in various activities, starting with sports. As athletics are of high importance to me, I

believed that the students of my elementary school should have the opportunity to take part in sporting events as well. As a coach for each of the sports teams, I was able to encourage students from all grades to sign up to be a part of a team that they felt they would benefit from the most. With my drive to coach these students, I was also able to enact forms of discipline—the discipline some of the students never had. Because of this I was able to see many of the students mature both inside and outside of the classroom, and I gave each of them opportunities to set leadership examples amongst their peers. Being able to offer a life of athletics to the school also gave me the ability to introduce a possible passion the students might develop; sure enough, there were several students who went on to play sports outside of school for various teams, and, eventually, high school. I was the catalyst for the athletic passion of the students.

This, in turn, allowed me to view the familial hardships within my community, including my own, as a way to engage with the entirety of my community to overcome the obstacles of hardships. In many ways, my experience with service to my community has indeed influenced the pursuit of my future career in Aerospace Engineering. As I continue to pursue a career in my field of study, my life of service will continue as I will begin to serve a different community: the space industry. As space exploration will continue to show its prominence in our world, I believe that I, along with other members of the engineering community, will work together to make a difference in the world in order to solve major problems within the world of engineering. With this, I believe the Vernon CommUNITY Fund will assist me in achieving my academic goals by allowing me a continued and extensive education to aid me in the preparation of becoming an Aerospace Engineer. The Vernon CommUNITY Fund, then, will allow me to focus my time on harnessing and developing skills of application of mathematics and science to real-world situations.





I. Vernon CommUNITY Fund Scholarship Program Guidelines

The Vernon CommUNITY Fund Scholarship Program focuses on 12th grade students living in the Vernon Area (which includes the cities of Vernon, Maywood, Bell, Huntington Park, Commerce, the area within the City of Los Angeles known as Boyle Heights, and the unincorporated area known as East Los Angeles).

Scholarship Criteria

Vernon Municipal Code ("VMC") Section 2.166(a)(vi) sets forth the specific selection criteria for scholarship recipients and will be the specific standards used to identify qualified applicants who, ultimately, will be recommended as scholarship recipients. Selection criteria have been identified to clearly define the profile of the scholarship recipient.

Many factors will be considered when evaluating scholarship applicants. Scholarship criteria include an applicant's financial need, academic achievement, and the geographic distribution of scholarships. The scholarship criteria support the purpose of the Vernon CommUNITY Fund, which was established to provide charitable contributions in support of improved quality of life, strengthening of families, and affirmation of Vernon's ties with neighboring communities in pursuit of bright futures. The Vernon CommUNITY Fund Scholarship Program was created to provide disadvantaged youth in the Vernon Area the opportunity to achieve success in their post-secondary educational endeavors.

Award Criteria

- Financial need (30 points)
- Community/extracurricular involvement and leadership (30 points)
- Academic achievement (20 points)
- Awards and recognition (10 points)
- Personal and/or family attributes and values (10 points)

Eligibility

12th grade students enrolling in a post-secondary educational institution with full-time status who reside in the Vernon Area (as defined above) may submit an application for a Vernon CommUNITY Fund (VCF) Scholarship.

Specific eligibility standards are identified within this section. In order to be considered for award, applicants must meet <u>all</u> of the following detailed criteria:

- Graduating High School Senior
- Achievement of a Minimum Weighted Grade Point Average of 2.0 in high school level coursework for trade school or two-year College applicants; or Minimum Weighted Grade Point Average of 2.5 in high school level coursework for four-year College/University applicants at the time of VCF Scholarship application submission



- Pursuit of a two-year or four-year Degree from accredited College/University; or pursuit of Trade School Certification
- Full-time enrollment at post-secondary educational institution of choice (minimum of 12 units for college) at the time of award
- Immediate transition into a post-secondary educational institution upon graduation from high school (must begin post-secondary coursework within 6 months of graduation)
- Residency in the Vernon Area (U.S. Citizenship is not required); minimum Area residency of 12 months
- Demonstration of strong leadership skills and responsibility (successfully communicated in scholarship application)
- Active in extracurricular activities (i.e., school/community involvement/employment/internship)
- A minimum of 20 hours of community service from 9th grade to first semester of 12th grade
- Not a City of Vernon employee or a legal dependent of a City of Vernon employee, Vernon City-appointed
 official, or Vernon City-elected official

Application Procedures

The information requested on the application is a reflection of the selection criteria designated for the VCF Scholarship Program. The following question and answer section (Q&A) addresses issues related to the VCF Scholarship application process:

- Q: Where and when are scholarship applications available?
- A: Beginning on January 1st of each year, applications will be available on the Vernon CommUNITY Fund website: www.vernoncommunityfund.org
- **Q:** Where should scholarship applications be submitted?
- A: Students may submit their complete application packages to the Vernon City Hall City Administration Office. Contact information is available on the website if any questions or technical issues arise during the application submission process.
- **Q:** When are scholarship applications due?
- A: The Vernon CommUNITY Fund will accept scholarship applications through the last Thursday in March.
- Q: What additional information/documents must accompany the scholarship application?
- As per the eligibility criteria noted above, students must submit proof that they reside and have resided for at least 12 months in the Vernon Area (e.g. utility bills); most recent report card; evidence of GPA with high school transcripts; sworn statement (found on the Vernon CommUNITY Fund website in scholarship applicant package) of a teacher or program director/supervisor with knowledge that applicant has performed the minimum amount of community service; and evidence of extracurricular activities. Although not required, students may also include letter(s) of recommendation, and/or letter(s) from post-secondary educational institution(s) along with their scholarship application.



Q: How and when will the scholarship award winners be notified?

A: Scholarship grant applicants recommended for award will be reviewed at the regular VCF Grant Committee meeting in May. Applicants selected for award will be notified within one week of scholarship award via email.

Q: How and when will the scholarship awards be disbursed?

A: Award disbursement will occur in June, with checks directly mailed to scholarship grantees.

The VCF Grant Committee retains the right to withhold scholarship grants in any given year if no candidate is determined to be qualified.

Additional Considerations

- Scholarship amount will be based on applicant competition and funds available for award
- Personal interview of scholarship applicant may or may not be required, and shall be determined after initial review of applicant pool
- Applications may be summarily denied, with or without prior notification to the applicant, if any statements or representations in the application and supporting materials are found to be untruthful, dishonest, or misleading

Selection Procedures

Procedures for selection of award will mirror the current process used for the award of direct service grants and capital grants through the Vernon CommUNITY Fund. The initial evaluation of a scholarship application will be a joint effort amongst City staff and consultant, Jemmott Rollins Group (JRG). Ultimately, the application of any candidate(s) recommended for award will be brought to the Vernon CommUNITY Grant Committee in May for deliberation and approval(s) of grant(s).

The VCF Scholarship Program is designed to benefit a broad class of beneficiaries through an objective process that is nondiscriminatory in nature.



II. Vernon CommUNITY Fund Scholarship Program Timeline

A VCF Scholarship Program Timeline has been established based upon the calendar year. In summary, applications are accepted beginning January 1st through the last Thursday in March of a given year. In May, the Vernon CommUNITY Fund Grant Committee will select scholarship grantees. Funds for scholarship awards will be dispersed in June to all scholarship grant recipients.

January - March

Window to receive candidate applications for VCF Scholarship Program

April

Review of candidate applications to determine recommended grant awards for VCF Grant Committee approval

May

Approval of VCF Scholarship Grant Awards at the regular May VCF Grant Committee Meeting (held on the 3rd Wednesday in May at 10:00 a.m.)

June

VCF Scholarship Grant Awards are processed for payment

Lucia Langaney

Approaching the iconic pillars of the Los Angeles International Airport, the realization that my biggest fear had come true hit me. My mom was leaving for Peru as part of the process to receive her US residency. She lived in the US for 20 years as an undocumented immigrant, and as her child, I lived in constant fear that one day the person I shared every breathing moment with could be sent away indefinitely.

As soon as her plane left the ground, an ocean of responsibility flooded over me. It became harder every day to stay afloat without knowing when or if she would return.

My most important responsibility was now being my 7-year-old sister's caretaker. I made her meals before and after school, dressed her in her uniform, and attempted to tame her thick wavy hair. I always felt ashamed when I dropped my sister off at school with frizzy fly-aways because the hair gel wouldn't hold. No matter how many YouTube tutorials I watched, I couldn't match my mom's skill and experience when styling Latina hair.

All of my responsibilities began to pile up and, without a mother figure, I had no one to rely on when everything was relying on me. I developed a plan to balance my duties and my computer science activities through the use of schedules. I set apart time to do house chores, school work, and personal hobbies, such as coding courses. Although at times my plan felt like I was scooping water out of my sinking boat with a teacup, it provided the support I needed to balance my responsibilities without jeopardizing my sister's wellbeing, my academics, or my passion.

When my mom returned home after two months, the ocean of responsibility drained away, leaving behind the lessons I learned about grit like valuable seashells washed up on the ocean shore.

This lesson allowed me to gain confidence in my ability to balance my responsibilities without spreading myself out too thin. I joined multiple computer science programs. In the Girls Who Code Summer Immersion Program, I prepared for a career in tech through real-world projects and met women in tech careers. I participated in workshops that focused on building networking skills. As my culminating project, I developed a website focused on spreading awareness about Cuba's Humanitarian crisis, an issue that is important to me as part of my family is currently living through that situation. In the Kode with Klossy program, I, along with other highly-motivated females from around the globe, learned about the different concepts of website development. I developed a website that would positively impact my community, Southeast LA, by combating food deserts and language barriers. I discovered that by pushing my bounds of capability, I can grow as a caretaker, student, and computer scientist. I found that I can make a difference in my community using computer science.

My mainly Hispanic community of Southeast LA breathes in polluted air emitted by the congested freeways that run above our homes and the neighboring factories that blow out harmful chemicals in the air. We walk on streets covered in garbage pollution. The fact that it has become normalized for multiple generations in my community is worrying. Being a member of this community, I want to help end the environmental pollution we experience by finding solutions using computer science and my college education.

Unfortunately, these problems sometimes go unnoticed because there are not enough people of color from communities like mine in this industry. My long-term career goal is to work

at a company that has the same values as mine. I hope to gain a degree in technology and use the growing power of artificial intelligence and machine learning to limit pollution found in my community. An idea I have for a possible solution to this issue in my community is creating a mobile application for cell phones that would help people recycle their waste items. This app would use machine learning to read wrappers, identify materials, and recognize other defining qualities of trash. Additionally, I was recently accepted into USC Viterbi School of Engineering as an incoming undergraduate student. There, I hope to conduct research with professors like Professor Raghavan that are using computer science for sustainability, specifically to find ways to store energy in data for later use.

Although I know the problem is much greater than people improperly disposing of waste or finding renewable sources of energy, I do believe that everyone contributing a part to solving a big problem can make a big difference. I want to be the facilitator of that change in my Hispanic community.

I. Vernon CommUNITY Fund Scholarship Program Guidelines

The Vernon CommUNITY Fund Scholarship Program focuses on 12th grade students living in the Vernon Area (which includes the cities of Vernon, Maywood, Bell, Huntington Park, Commerce, the area within the City of Los Angeles known as Boyle Heights, and the unincorporated area known as East Los Angeles).

Scholarship Criteria

Vernon Municipal Code ("VMC") Section 2.166(a)(vi) sets forth the specific selection criteria for scholarship recipients and will be the specific standards used to identify qualified applicants who, ultimately, will be recommended as scholarship recipients. Selection criteria have been identified to clearly define the profile of the scholarship recipient.

Many factors will be considered when evaluating scholarship applicants. Scholarship criteria include an applicant's financial need, academic achievement, and the geographic distribution of scholarships. The scholarship criteria support the purpose of the Vernon CommUNITY Fund, which was established to provide charitable contributions in support of improved quality of life, strengthening of families, and affirmation of Vernon's ties with neighboring communities in pursuit of bright futures. The Vernon CommUNITY Fund Scholarship Program was created to provide disadvantaged youth in the Vernon Area the opportunity to achieve success in their post-secondary educational endeavors.

Award Criteria

- Financial need (30 points)
- Community/extracurricular involvement and leadership (30 points)
- Academic achievement (20 points)
- Awards and recognition (10 points)
- Personal and/or family attributes and values (10 points)

Eligibility

12th grade students enrolling in a post-secondary educational institution with full-time status who reside in the Vernon Area (as defined above) may submit an application for a Vernon CommUNITY Fund (VCF) Scholarship.

Specific eligibility standards are identified within this section. In order to be considered for award, applicants must meet all of the following detailed criteria:

- Graduating High School Senior
- Achievement of a Minimum Weighted Grade Point Average of 2.0 in high school level coursework for trade school or two-year College applicants; or Minimum Weighted Grade Point Average of 2.5 in high school level coursework for four-year College/University applicants at the time of VCF Scholarship application submission



- Pursuit of a two-year or four-year Degree from accredited College/University; or pursuit of Trade School Certification
- Full-time enrollment at post-secondary educational institution of choice (minimum of 12 units for college) at the time of award
- Immediate transition into a post-secondary educational institution upon graduation from high school (must begin post-secondary coursework within 6 months of graduation)
- Residency in the Vernon Area (U.S. Citizenship is not required); minimum Area residency of 12 months
- Demonstration of strong leadership skills and responsibility (successfully communicated in scholarship application)
- Active in extracurricular activities (i.e., school/community involvement/employment/internship)
- A minimum of 20 hours of community service from 9th grade to first semester of 12th grade
- Not a City of Vernon employee or a legal dependent of a City of Vernon employee, Vernon City-appointed official, or Vernon City-elected official

Application Procedures

The information requested on the application is a reflection of the selection criteria designated for the VCF Scholarship Program. The following question and answer section (Q&A) addresses issues related to the VCF Scholarship application process:

- **Q:** Where and when are scholarship applications available?
- A: Beginning on January 1st of each year, applications will be available on the Vernon CommUNITY Fund website: www.vernoncommunityfund.org
- **Q:** Where should scholarship applications be submitted?
- A: Students may submit their complete application packages to the Vernon City Hall City Administration Office. Contact information is available on the website if any questions or technical issues arise during the application submission process.
- **Q:** When are scholarship applications due?
- **A:** The Vernon CommUNITY Fund will accept scholarship applications through the last Thursday in March.
- Q: What additional information/documents must accompany the scholarship application?
- As per the eligibility criteria noted above, students must submit proof that they reside and have resided for at least 12 months in the Vernon Area (e.g. utility bills); most recent report card; evidence of GPA with high school transcripts; sworn statement (found on the Vernon CommUNITY Fund website in scholarship applicant package) of a teacher or program director/supervisor with knowledge that applicant has performed the minimum amount of community service; and evidence of extracurricular activities. Although not required, students may also include letter(s) of recommendation, and/or letter(s) from post-secondary educational institution(s) along with their scholarship application.



Q: How and when will the scholarship award winners be notified?

A: Scholarship grant applicants recommended for award will be reviewed at the regular VCF Grant Committee meeting in May. Applicants selected for award will be notified within one week of scholarship award via email.

Q: How and when will the scholarship awards be disbursed?

A: Award disbursement will occur in June, with checks directly mailed to scholarship grantees.

The VCF Grant Committee retains the right to withhold scholarship grants in any given year if no candidate is determined to be qualified.

Additional Considerations

- Scholarship amount will be based on applicant competition and funds available for award
- Personal interview of scholarship applicant may or may not be required, and shall be determined after initial review of applicant pool
- Applications may be summarily denied, with or without prior notification to the applicant, if any statements or representations in the application and supporting materials are found to be untruthful, dishonest, or misleading

Selection Procedures

Procedures for selection of award will mirror the current process used for the award of direct service grants and capital grants through the Vernon CommUNITY Fund. The initial evaluation of a scholarship application will be a joint effort amongst City staff and consultant, Jemmott Rollins Group (JRG). Ultimately, the application of any candidate(s) recommended for award will be brought to the Vernon CommUNITY Grant Committee in May for deliberation and approval(s) of grant(s).

The VCF Scholarship Program is designed to benefit a broad class of beneficiaries through an objective process that is nondiscriminatory in nature.



II. Vernon CommUNITY Fund Scholarship Program Timeline

A VCF Scholarship Program Timeline has been established based upon the calendar year. In summary, applications are accepted beginning January 1st through the last Thursday in March of a given year. In May, the Vernon CommUNITY Fund Grant Committee will select scholarship grantees. Funds for scholarship awards will be dispersed in June to all scholarship grant recipients.

January – March

Window to receive candidate applications for VCF Scholarship Program

April

Review of candidate applications to determine recommended grant awards for VCF Grant Committee approval

May

Approval of VCF Scholarship Grant Awards at the regular May VCF Grant Committee Meeting (held on the 3rd Wednesday in May at 10:00 a.m.)

June

VCF Scholarship Grant Awards are processed for payment

- Discuss your academic ability and potential to be successful in your pursuits
- Provide a coherent, well-organized written product that conveys why you should receive a VCF Scholarship
- Identify any unique characteristics about yourself, your family and/or life circumstances that you would like to be considered in the evaluation of your application package

The prompts above appear in no particular order of importance, nor are you required to address each in your essay. The essay guide has been designed to provide you with insight into what the VCF Grant Committee may be interested in learning about you as a VCF Scholarship Applicant.

Your essay must be submitted in the following format:

- Typed (12 point font)
- Double spaced
- Written in first-person
- A combined total of three (3) pages or less

Reminders for Your Written Work

Structure/Organization

Your essay should give the reader a concise sense of who you are and how your particular life experiences have contributed to your current path. The structure of the essay should support its overall message and convey your personality. The story that you are telling should be logical, with a clear introduction, solid supporting ideas, and a conclusion.



Specific Examples

If you choose to reference life experiences or situations in your essay, they should be specific and not general. Each example that you include in your essay should help showcase your character traits and distinguish you, as an individual, from the other applicants.

Significance

The experiences or situations you include in the essay should address the prompts in a meaningful way. Additionally, they should show significance to your overall message, and lend support to your educational, career, and personal goals.

As a first-generation student, I've had several unfortunate experiences of being discriminated against due to my parents' lack of college guidance and educational knowledge. Both my older siblings attended college and dropped out because of our financial circumstances and the scarcity of knowledge on free opportunities to pay for college costs. Fearing that I would end up in the same situation as my siblings, I sought support.

In my freshman year, although I did not know my academic counselor, I took the initiative to ask for educational support and guidance. I expected to receive support but instead, my academic counselor turned me down. They made no attempt to connect me with someone who could help me, which was devastating, but I was still determined to find help. I went to the college center at my school and instantly received support from the college counselor although I was not a senior which immediately made me feel hope.

This college counselor guided me through my years in high school. Through my college center, I discovered and joined two College Readiness programs, TELACU Upward Bound and UCLA EAOP. I participated in TELACU's opportunity for a summer enrichment program at the University of Southern California which included staying at USC while taking college courses. This experience encouraged me to value taking advantage of free opportunities. When my sophomore year began, I took advantage of free college classes to improve and advance my skills. In addition, through EAOP I attended financial aid workshops that taught me a variety of ways to receive free money for college. I learned not to let my aspirations be hindered by my circumstances, to seek help, and take advantage of the educational support there is.

I discovered that many first-generation students, like myself, struggle to obtain educational help as a result of my investigation of many of these fantastic initiatives. I assisted in the development of an educational opportunity at my school. I wanted to make high school more accessible for students by providing a support structure. I spearheaded the development of a tutoring program for our school. I would tutor in over seven courses in the mornings and afternoons. I was amazed by the number of students we were able to assist. Multiple students stated that they were encouraged to speak up for themselves as well as others.

I continued to take advantage of countless chances and through MESA an engineering preparation course, I discovered my passion for engineering after cooperating on numerous challenges such as building a prosthetic arm out of recycled materials and a structural bridge out of balsa wood. In the LAunch Pad College of ECST program with CSULA, I collaborated with college engineering professionals on circuits and constructed and conducted experiments on structural models. When I told my family that I wanted to pursue a STEM degree, they were not as enthusiastic as I had hoped. Instead of dismissing myself, I was pushed to prove them wrong and demonstrate that as a woman in STEM, I can be successful.

Throughout my life, I have advocated for myself and others in various ways, including the creation of a tutoring program at my school and my gun violence prevention legislation podcast. Being under-resourced has motivated me to collaborate with others, be resourceful, and share ideas/resources. Few students take advantage of the resources available to them; on the other end, I have sought out and built my own resources. I've been through a lot of hardships that have helped me grow into a better person with a strong mindset.

I hope to continue to create a positive difference in my community. Through living in the same city since birth, I have plenty of time to discover the many ways our community can be improved. One of the main issues is the lack of modernization in our infrastructures. As a future civil engineer, I want to help ensure that we are not just laying sturdy foundations, but also developing means to replace our structures in such a manner that they may be enhanced or modernized as they age. I want to help build structures for cities like mine that are at risk. In order to continue to pursue higher education, I need financial support since I am low income with no support to be able to count on from my family. With the help of this scholarship, I can set apart my circumstances and not have to worry about my financial bind to be able to accomplish my goals.

I. Vernon CommUNITY Fund Scholarship Program Guidelines

The Vernon CommUNITY Fund Scholarship Program focuses on 12th grade students living in the Vernon Area (which includes the cities of Vernon, Maywood, Bell, Huntington Park, Commerce, the area within the City of Los Angeles known as Boyle Heights, and the unincorporated area known as East Los Angeles).

Scholarship Criteria

Vernon Municipal Code ("VMC") Section 2.166(a)(vi) sets forth the specific selection criteria for scholarship recipients and will be the specific standards used to identify qualified applicants who, ultimately, will be recommended as scholarship recipients. Selection criteria have been identified to clearly define the profile of the scholarship recipient.

Many factors will be considered when evaluating scholarship applicants. Scholarship criteria include an applicant's financial need, academic achievement, and the geographic distribution of scholarships. The scholarship criteria support the purpose of the Vernon CommUNITY Fund, which was established to provide charitable contributions in support of improved quality of life, strengthening of families, and affirmation of Vernon's ties with neighboring communities in pursuit of bright futures. The Vernon CommUNITY Fund Scholarship Program was created to provide disadvantaged youth in the Vernon Area the opportunity to achieve success in their post-secondary educational endeavors.

Award Criteria

- Financial need (30 points)
- Community/extracurricular involvement and leadership (30 points)
- Academic achievement (20 points)
- Awards and recognition (10 points)
- Personal and/or family attributes and values (10 points)

Eligibility

12th grade students enrolling in a post-secondary educational institution with full-time status who reside in the Vernon Area (as defined above) may submit an application for a Vernon CommUNITY Fund (VCF) Scholarship.

Specific eligibility standards are identified within this section. In order to be considered for award, applicants must meet all of the following detailed criteria:

- Graduating High School Senior
- Achievement of a Minimum Weighted Grade Point Average of 2.0 in high school level coursework for trade school or two-year College applicants; or Minimum Weighted Grade Point Average of 2.5 in high school level coursework for four-year College/University applicants at the time of VCF Scholarship application submission



- Pursuit of a two-year or four-year Degree from accredited College/University; or pursuit of Trade School Certification
- Full-time enrollment at post-secondary educational institution of choice (minimum of 12 units for college) at the time of award
- Immediate transition into a post-secondary educational institution upon graduation from high school (must begin post-secondary coursework within 6 months of graduation)
- Residency in the Vernon Area (U.S. Citizenship is not required); minimum Area residency of 12 months
- Demonstration of strong leadership skills and responsibility (successfully communicated in scholarship application)
- Active in extracurricular activities (i.e., school/community involvement/employment/internship)
- A minimum of 20 hours of community service from 9th grade to first semester of 12th grade
- Not a City of Vernon employee or a legal dependent of a City of Vernon employee, Vernon City-appointed official, or Vernon City-elected official

Application Procedures

The information requested on the application is a reflection of the selection criteria designated for the VCF Scholarship Program. The following question and answer section (Q&A) addresses issues related to the VCF Scholarship application process:

- **Q:** Where and when are scholarship applications available?
- A: Beginning on January 1st of each year, applications will be available on the Vernon CommUNITY Fund website: www.vernoncommunityfund.org
- **Q:** Where should scholarship applications be submitted?
- A: Students may submit their complete application packages to the Vernon City Hall City Administration Office. Contact information is available on the website if any questions or technical issues arise during the application submission process.
- **Q:** When are scholarship applications due?
- **A:** The Vernon CommUNITY Fund will accept scholarship applications through the last Thursday in March.
- Q: What additional information/documents must accompany the scholarship application?
- As per the eligibility criteria noted above, students must submit proof that they reside and have resided for at least 12 months in the Vernon Area (e.g. utility bills); most recent report card; evidence of GPA with high school transcripts; sworn statement (found on the Vernon CommUNITY Fund website in scholarship applicant package) of a teacher or program director/supervisor with knowledge that applicant has performed the minimum amount of community service; and evidence of extracurricular activities. Although not required, students may also include letter(s) of recommendation, and/or letter(s) from post-secondary educational institution(s) along with their scholarship application.



Q: How and when will the scholarship award winners be notified?

A: Scholarship grant applicants recommended for award will be reviewed at the regular VCF Grant Committee meeting in May. Applicants selected for award will be notified within one week of scholarship award via email.

Q: How and when will the scholarship awards be disbursed?

A: Award disbursement will occur in June, with checks directly mailed to scholarship grantees.

The VCF Grant Committee retains the right to withhold scholarship grants in any given year if no candidate is determined to be qualified.

Additional Considerations

- Scholarship amount will be based on applicant competition and funds available for award
- Personal interview of scholarship applicant may or may not be required, and shall be determined after initial review of applicant pool
- Applications may be summarily denied, with or without prior notification to the applicant, if any statements or representations in the application and supporting materials are found to be untruthful, dishonest, or misleading

Selection Procedures

Procedures for selection of award will mirror the current process used for the award of direct service grants and capital grants through the Vernon CommUNITY Fund. The initial evaluation of a scholarship application will be a joint effort amongst City staff and consultant, Jemmott Rollins Group (JRG). Ultimately, the application of any candidate(s) recommended for award will be brought to the Vernon CommUNITY Grant Committee in May for deliberation and approval(s) of grant(s).

The VCF Scholarship Program is designed to benefit a broad class of beneficiaries through an objective process that is nondiscriminatory in nature.



II. Vernon CommUNITY Fund Scholarship Program Timeline

A VCF Scholarship Program Timeline has been established based upon the calendar year. In summary, applications are accepted beginning January 1st through the last Thursday in March of a given year. In May, the Vernon CommUNITY Fund Grant Committee will select scholarship grantees. Funds for scholarship awards will be dispersed in June to all scholarship grant recipients.

January – March

Window to receive candidate applications for VCF Scholarship Program

April

Review of candidate applications to determine recommended grant awards for VCF Grant Committee approval

May

Approval of VCF Scholarship Grant Awards at the regular May VCF Grant Committee Meeting (held on the 3rd Wednesday in May at 10:00 a.m.)

June

VCF Scholarship Grant Awards are processed for payment

- Identify any unique characteristics about yourself, your family and/or life circumstances that you would like to be considered in the evaluation of your application package

The prompts above appear in no particular order of importance, nor are you required to address each in your essay. The essay guide has been designed to provide you with insight into what the VCF Grant Committee may be interested in learning about you as a VCF Scholarship Applicant.

Your essay must be submitted in the following format:

- Typed (12 point font)
- Double spaced
- Written in first-person
- A combined total of three (3) pages or less

Reminders for Your Written Work

Structure/Organization

Your essay should give the reader a concise sense of who you are and how your particular life experiences have contributed to your current path. The structure of the essay should support its overall message and convey your personality. The story that you are telling should be logical, with a clear introduction, solid supporting ideas, and a conclusion.



Specific Examples

If you choose to reference life experiences or situations in your essay, they should be specific and not general. Each example that you include in your essay should help showcase your character traits and distinguish you, as an individual, from the other applicants.

Significance

The experiences or situations you include in the essay should address the prompts in a meaningful way. Additionally, they should show significance to your overall message, and lend support to your educational, career, and personal goals.

On a typical day, I come home from school to the sounds of my nephews and nieces laughing, playing, and crying. "Sana sana colita de rana," my old mother would lovingly coo to my nephew after he bruised his knee. My sister would be feeding my niece, trying to calm her down. Even as my sister had a family of her own, she could not afford to leave our small apartment. We lived paycheck to paycheck and used my father's disability payments to get by. Often, he was absent from this scene because he was busy working or drinking. This was the dynamic I was often met with when I would arrive home.

I felt ashamed when I glanced at the television and saw "normal" families. They enter their large home. A mother would be guiding her child towards college, a father would spend time with his children. No one struggled with their mental health or finances. Every family member was pale with beautiful, blonde hair. In contrast, we were everything but that. My mother would make beans and rice every afternoon, but I envied the families on television who ate large American meals together. "Why couldn't I have a big room to study in? Why couldn't I have a loving dad? Why couldn't I have a *normal* culture?" I would ask myself.

Despite the turmoil, I would sit on the floor of my room and begin to study. The topics I would explore on that bedroom floor shaped my future. One afternoon, I would research how to navigate the FAFSA. Another afternoon, the topic would be a complex function from AP Calculus. Some days, I would explore how to paint with dynamic lighting. My parents had immigrated from Mexico, dropping out very early in their high school careers. My sister and brother did not attend college. This meant that I could be the first in this family. It was clear my parents struggled to raise us without a college degree, and it taught me the value in education. So, every day, I sat on that floor and became the pioneer to my life.

I would make the most of what little resources and educational support I had. At the start of every year, I took every rigorous course available and sought out even more challenges. When I could not take AP calculus and AP statistics together, I would locate a college class equivalent to statistics to foster my passion for mathematics. I would take college level anthropology or psychology solely because I loved to explore my education.

The emotional support of those around me was felt every day. No one believed that my circumstances should control the outcome of my future. Rather, I was taught that college could prepare me for my future career, no dream was impossible, and working hard towards my goals would pay off. Many who said this were first-generation just like me. They were the role models I needed; I felt empowered by their stories. My household did not need to be like the families on television for me to succeed. I was not restricted by the troubles I faced at home. Rather, I learned to love my family. I have a unique perspective because of my amazing culture. Being a first-generation Latina is a powerful label, it meant that nothing could stop me from my future.

This inspired me to participate in extracurriculars which fostered loving environments and encouraged us to give back to the community. I recall the times I would laugh with my fellow Key Club members as we would give candy to the children in our community. There is nothing more emotionally fulfilling than seeing the smile of a child after giving them candy, or a toy, knowing that it was my influence that caused this moment. Other times, during the Youth Civic Leaders Program under The United Way, we would be discussing vital issues within our education and what we could do to act on them. I always felt heard, and I made sure everyone else felt heard, too. We found solace in the supportive environment that we grew.

Engaging in programs focused on the community and inclusivity truly opened my eyes to the importance of being a humanitarian and a feminist. I love seeing my actions turn into positive change and elevate those around me. In college, I will continue to foster this passion for education and the community. I fully intend to maintain the same passion and drive I have now. I will challenge myself with rigorous coursework, exploring all the subjects I love, while planning a new food drive or raising funds for homeless children. After college, I hope to pursue data analysis and work within education. I look forward to exploring this subject and learning the ways that I could use my skills to give back to my community. Someday, I see myself being in the same position that my role models once were. Another young woman will find that she is intelligent, powerful, and strong, no matter what she has faced or will face, because I am proof that nothing can restrict you from reaching your full potential. In turn, I will be analyzing data to create an initiative to better support our students. I hope to be the individual to find solutions to long-term, underlying problems within our institution.

In my future, education will help elevate me to fight for our students, support those with marginalized backgrounds, and support those who are first generation. My parents fully support my journey to become the first in our family to pursue college, and I know I will make them proud. However, I will continue to face the financial barriers that have kept me in shackles from reaching my true potential. Even so, I am determined to find any way to minimize the burden of debt during my educational journey. Receiving a VCF Scholarship will help with the challenges of with paying for college, as well as helping me make the most of my time during college. 



Ever since I was younger, I felt "different" compared to the rest of my family. I felt uncomfortable wearing clothing that was appropriate for my gender and didn't understand why it was such a big deal to like people of the same gender. Unfortunately, I could not express these concerns to my family, as they had made it clear about their opinions on such topics. However, my friends and teachers, who were confident in themselves and their identities, were more than willing to help me detangle what mess my emotions had become. I remember when I started to tell my friends about my new identity after coming back from the pandemic. I was afraid that I would be shunned by friends. I felt safe and I was received with open arms. I was relieved that I was supported by those I came out to, giving me confidence that I shouldn't be afraid of who I am. Although I still use my birth name sometimes, I mostly go by Arlo, but I can confidently tell you now that I am a proud hispanic transgender man. I'm very happy with who I am, even if my family won't completely support me when I come out to them, I support myself and that's enough for me.

Most of my friends were involved with the school's marching band, so I felt inclined to join them there. Although I initially joined because of them, I found a new love for music there and a new safe space. I was heavily involved, so much so that I eventually became the band's drumline section leader. I also had the honor of being a member of the LAUSD All City Honor Band, a band that plays in the Rose Parade annually, once as a trumpet player and twice as a cymbal player. One year I was even the section leader for All City's cymbal line. These musical groups have served as a safe space for me throughout the years, as oftentimes everyone I encountered was very supportive and referred to me as Arlo. They gave me the assurance I needed to come out to some of my siblings and they became some of my greatest supporters.

Their support, as well as my friends, gave me the confidence I needed to be successful in my academic, musical and personal goals.

Participating in a marching band comes with overbearing demands, such as long practices and after school performances that can take a toll on you. Nonetheless, my education has always been a top priority for me. I am a part of my school's magnet program, have taken many AP classes, remained in my school's high honor roll throughout high school, and consistently kept my grades up. It is actually through one of the AP classes I took that sparked an interest in my future career; computer science.

In said class, I learned about the "digital gap". This is the idea that people in more marginalized communities don't experience the same technological advancements as those in areas of a higher socioeconomic status with less people of color. It became especially obvious to me when I realized how much that affects not only my family, but other people that look like me. Now I was no stranger to noticing how our general area doesn't have the same type of funding as other areas but I didn't realize how jarring these developments are becoming in a world that's becoming increasingly reliant on technology. I have watched my parents often struggle to adapt to technological changes and more often than not, no help was offered. Although it is astonishing to see how quick and efficient these advancements are, it's not fair to leave certain communities behind because they don't have the resources to keep up.

While working with code and computers seems fun, what seems more appealing to me is being able to make the world a little more accessible to everyone in it. One of my favorite quotes has always been, "we're only as strong as our weakest link." This is what I think of when I think about the digital gap. I realized that the same support that I vividly remember receiving from my bandmates, friends and siblings is the same type of support I want to offer to others, as their

kindness and support made me who I am and I want to pass it on to others. College has endless opportunities, ones that I wouldn't encounter in high school, which encourages me to pursue higher education. It also just so happened that Computer Science is a rather general field, one that I could use to achieve my goals, such as helping increase digital literacy, establishments and connections that would make computers accessible and making computer-related clubs and classes the new norm. This career would allow me to have a positive impact on society since I would be able to be one of the people making the world more accessible and equitable for people that are often overlooked. However, in order to achieve these dreams of helping others, I would need to pursue a higher education so I can be more educated and experienced in this field.

My AP class has only given me a taste of what computer science can offer and I'm ecstatic to further pursue this interest in college. I know it's a difficult field like any other, but I'm confident that I'll be able to keep up. I have the desire and determination to learn and strive to be better as a person and a student, something I can work on in college. This scholarship will be able to help me achieve these goals because I know college can be extremely expensive.

These funds will allow me to further focus on my education without having to worry about certain college fees, allowing more time to hone in my knowledge academically. College is stressful, but this scholarship will help lessen the burden and allow me to be closer to achieving my goal of giving back to my community with the same support that I was given years prior.







SUBJECT

Vernon CommUNITY Fund Allocation and Grantmaking Recommendations for Fiscal Year (FY) 2022-23

Recommendation:

Discuss the anticipated Vernon CommUNITY Fund grantmaking program allocation for FY 2022-23, provide recommendations to staff for grantmaking in the upcoming fiscal year, and determine distribution for Direct Service Grants and Scholarship Grants.

Background:

The City Council created the Vernon CommUNITY Fund (VCF) to provide grants to charitable and governmental entities for projects and programs that benefit those residing and working in Vernon and, on February 4, 2014, the City Council established the Vernon CommUNITY Fund Grant Committee (Grant Committee), providing the basic guidelines and operational procedures for said Committee and its officers, including those related to the allocation of funds and the processes for reviewing and ranking applications and awarding grants. The VCF highlights the City's commitment to be a good neighbor to the Southeast Los Angeles region and upholds its responsibility to good governance and service to the community.

FY 2022-23 VCF Budget

Pursuant to Vernon Municipal Code Section 2.48.100, the City Council may appropriate funds to the VCF at its discretion. Typically, the VCF allocation is approved through the normal budgetary process, with City Council authorizing a fixed amount to the VCF. For FY 2022-23 (which begins on July 1, 2022), staff will be recommending an allocation of \$500,000. Assuming that the proposed allocation will be approved, the VCF may discuss at its May 18, 2022 meeting recommendations for grantmaking in the upcoming fiscal year, and distributions for Direct Service Grants and Scholarship Grants.

As per VCF guidelines, Administrative Costs shall first be determined for the fiscal year and the amount shall be allocated for payment from funds appropriated to the VCF. For FY 2022-23, after an estimated \$111,800 for administrative costs associated to grantmaking, process management, tracking, and applicant evaluation, the remaining amount available for Vernon CommUNITY Fund grantmaking would be \$387,800. In the previous fiscal year, the Grant Committee approved a breakdown of the VCF allocation as follows: 95% for Direct Service Grants; and 5% for Scholarship Grants.

VCF Allocation Distribution

The Grant Committee has full discretion to advise on its preferred breakdown of the grant allocation, and may adjust or modify the blueprint for the new fiscal year as it sees fit. For example, if there is a consensus on the Grant Committee to increase the percentage of grant funds available for the VCF Scholarship Program, the Grant Committee may make a recommendation to staff accordingly. Likewise, if there is consensus among Grant Committee Members to pursue non-profit organization grant applicants with a particular focus or offering

for the Vernon Area, recommendations may be provided to staff.

For the upcoming FY 2022-23, the Grant Committee may wish to consider a larger distribution amount for Scholarship Grants. The VCF Scholarship Program is a vehicle that offers many motivated, exceptional young people a path to accomplish their academic and career goals. The program has proven to be a great opportunity for the VCF to establish a personal, viable connection with youth in the Vernon Area while supporting their pursuits of higher education and, in turn, elevating the region as a whole by ensuring that the career goals of students in the community are more attainable. With its scholarships, the VCF Grant Committee may directly impact the lives of young people who are eager to give back to their communities.

Since there is a finite amount of non-profit organizations in the VCF-defined Vernon Area, many of the Direct Service Grants awarded by the Grant Committee in recent years have been for repeat grantees. This is not to suggest that each recipient has not been deserving of a grant in every instance it has been received; however, it is important to note that moneys are frequently provided to non-profits that have previously received VCF funds. The Grant Committee may contemplate the Direct Service Grant distribution as it deems appropriate.

If the allocation of \$500,000 is approved by City Council during the normal budgetary process for the City, there is much flexibility to utilize funds (after covering Administrative Costs) for both Direct Service and Scholarship Grants. An example of an allocation distribution for FY 2022-23 that slightly modifies the previous year's breakdown would be:

- 88% for direct service grants (\$347,800)
- 12% for scholarship grants (\$40,000)

As previously noted, the Grant Committee has full discretion to advise on its preferred breakdown of the VCF allocation distribution for the upcoming fiscal year.

FY 2022-23 Meeting Schedule

Meeting dates for the Grant Committee will continue to occur in May and November, with Direct Service Grants to be considered for deliberation at the November meeting, and Scholarship Grants to be considered at the May meeting. The restructuring to two meetings per year has served the VCF well, allowing for a reduction in year-round grant activities performed, thereby simplifying VCF grant program management. The VCF model requires proportional administration to the fiscal year allocation, and ensures alignment with grantmaker best practices to streamline internal operations and administrative costs. As a result, VCF grant dollars continue to be maximized to positively impact the Vernon Area.

Fiscal Impact:
